bring the prop or have another homeschooler bring it. Performers should arrive at least 10 minutes early.



Q. What is Battle of the Books?

A. Battle of the Books is a trivia competition for students in kindergarten through 8th Grade.

Q. Are there teams?

A. Yes, teams are split by age group: Kindergarten through 2nd grade, 3nd grade through 5th grade and 6th grade through 8th grade. Each team can have 3-6 members.

Q. How do we know what to read? A. The book lists are available on our website: HomeschoolRocksFM.com. Each age group has 15 books to read and study.

New Year's Eve in Ecuador!

In Ecuador around New Year's, people make piñata type of characters called

Año Viejo (Old Year) then on New Year's Eve, at midnight they burn the Año Viejos to represent burning away the old year.

I interviewed Mario Xavier Garcia, who is a family member and also, he creates año viejos as a hobby.

The following answers will be translated and summarized from the original interview.

Q. What materials do you use?
A. The materials we use are wood, nails, newspaper, flour, water, and cardboard. We use the wood and nails to make the skeleton, then we use newspaper, that we put together by using flour and water to make the glue, after it dries, we use cardboard to give it more detail. Once we have it dried, we start to paint it. And if we want to give it even more detail then we would use foam.



Q. How is the price estimated?

A. Depending on how much we spend on materials and what we paid for labor. For example, if we paid \$30 on materials and \$20 per day of labor and we take 3 days then for labor it would be \$60, it would add up to \$90 and then we add the amount we want to make.

Q. Is this like a job?

A. Well, yes, some people use it as a profession; and they improve with the years. In my case I use it as a hobby that gives me more money.

Q. How long does it take to make it?

A. Well, a big Año Viejo* around 3 meters (almost 10 ft) takes at least a month; and a smaller one would take a week.

Q. How big is the largest you made?

A. The largest I have done was 3 meters (9 ft) tall and 1.5 meters wide (5 ft)

Q. Did you work alone or in a team?

A. I work in a team so I can work quicker and make more Año Viejos at the same time. Each person has a job.

Q. Where do you store them?

A. A big warehouse.

Q. Are the materials you use healthy for the environment? A. Most of the materials are being reused because the goal is to save money, but the paint could harm the environment.

The first Thanksgiving in 1621 was a 3-day festival celebrating the Pilgrim's first successful harvest. There was no turkey, potatoes or pumpkin pie at the first Thanksqiving. Instead, they probably ate venison, corn and cranberries, whole not in a sauce. There wasn't another Thanksgiving until 1789, when George Washington made it a national holiday. But it still didn't happen every year, until Sara Josepha Hale. Sara, the writer of "Mary Had a Little Lamb," campaigned to make Thanksgiving an annual holiday because she read a book about the Pilgrims. It took her thirty years! And now, every year on the fourth Thursday of November, we eat turkey and stuffing, with pumpkin pie because Sara published the recipes. One of the weirdest traditions started in 1989. Every

year, the President pardons a turkey, so instead of being dinner, he goes to live happily on a farm.

With the Christmas music starting to play in the stores and lights and decorations going up around my neighborhood I was wondering what this holiday season was really about?

While it's easy to get confused by the story of Santa Claus and Frosty the snowman, Christmas is actually a Christian holiday celebrating Jesus's birthday. He is believed to be born December 25th to Mary and Joseph in a manger in Bethlehem, Israel.

After many, many years of debate and arguments between different religious groups, the date December 25th was chosen to be the universal celebration of Jesus's birth. December 25th is the Winter equinox and also the shortest day of the year. It also happens to be exactly 9 months after the Spring equinox, which is when many religious leaders believed was the day that Mary was visited by an Angel and told that she was pregnant with a very special son. Now I know why my parents put an Angel on the top of our tree!

Dear Learning,

I can totally understand feeling weird about something, especially when other people are telling you that it is crazy. It's never a fun thing to be told that you are different and made to feel like it is a bad thing. But the truth is, the way you learn isn't actually that weird at all. There are many different ways to learn and learning with music and sound actually has a name. It's called auditory learning. Auditory learning is when you learn by hearing or listening to things like lectures where experts talk about a subject or learning about different subjects by repeating them in a song. There are even other ways of learning, like reading and writing learners easily learn by reading things like textbooks and writing book reports.

Visual learners are able to watch someone do something or watch a movie or video about a subject to learn. Then there is another type of learning called kinesthetic learning. Kinesthetic learners learn by doing hands-on activities like Lego building for engineering or learning to play an instrument. This sounds like the way your sister is learning with your mom, right now.

When I was in 2nd grade I had to memorize new spelling lists every week, and I had a really hard time with remembering the right order of letters and spelling the words the way my teacher was teaching us. I would get really frustrated every week and it would be so hard to keep up with my classmates. Finally, my mom came to the rescue and we worked out a new way to learn and memorize the spelling words every week. We would sing or cheer out the spelling of every word, over and over, until I finally got it and it was a lot more fun for me to learn that way. So I think all of those people telling you it's crazy are wrong. Learning by singing and listening to songs sounds like a way more fun idea than just reading it out of a book. I interviewed my grandma, Ladona. She is a police officer. Before she was a police officer officer she had A LOT of different jobs.

Q. What is your specific job title and what do you have to do?

A. I am a police sergeant at the Miami Dade police department. I have a supervisor position where I guide, assist, and direct officers working the road.

Q. Do you have to have any special training?

A. When you first get hired, no. They train you. And they continue training you throughout your years working there. But if you get higher education, this will help you get promoted.

Q. What tools do you use for your job and what do they do?

A. Police car; Handcuffs; Radio, to communicate; gun; taser (to stop somebody by putting electricity into their body); computer, use it daily; gun belt; and an AED, it jumpstarts a heart

Q. What is an AED?

A. It's a defibrillator. You hook the pads up to a person and restart their heart.

Q. Does the taser hurt them?

A. No it doesn't, it causes the muscles to lock up. Immobilizing them.

Q. What is on your gun belt?

A. Gun, extra ammo, flashlight, taser, handcuffs, radio, extra set of car keys, so you don't get locked out at a call, Asp,

Q. What's an Asp?

A. It's a stick. And it is used to help control a violent subject, by striking them in specific locations.

Q. Does it hurt?

A. Yes. So, we do not use it very often. We prefer to use a taser which doesn't cause injury.

Hi Mrs. K, I have some questions for you.

A. My job is a Behavior Specialist at an elementary school

A. Well, my day changes every day which keeps me from getting bored. Some days I go to work and before I even clock in my radio goes off. And that means someone is having trouble with a child. It's usually a behavior problem, sometimes they are crying because they are upset, sometimes they are afraid of something, so I have to go help them.

Q. What do you do?

A. I have to go into the classroom and help deescalate a child who are throwing desks or punching teachers. I type reports, do case studies and talk to parents to help them understand their children better. Sometimes I have to calm the adults down because they get very upset when they have lots of kids that don't listen.

Q. Do you teach kids?

A. I don't teach kids at school like I teach you. I don't teach them math or reading or writing. I teach them behavior.

Life in Peru: An Interview with Monica Rodriguez

Q.What is it like to live in Peru?

A. Monica told me that in Peru people speak Spanish, so when many American people come there, they do not know what Peruvians are saying. She also said that it's really, really colorful. Q. Do you help kids?

A. I would like to think that I help kids all of the time.

Q. How?

A. Sometimes they just need a hug or somebody to listen.

Q. How old are the kids you work with?

A. Pre-k to 5th grade, age 4-11

Q. How did you learn your job?

A. Well that is an interesting story. I didn't start out wanting to be a behavior specialist. I was a teacher and I saw all the kids at the school always in trouble and they put them in this big room, and nobody was helping them. They were just in trouble all of the time. So, I went to my boss and I said that next year I wanted those kids and I wanted to create a different kind of room. So, I did and I won a national award for it. And then they offered me a position as a behavior specialist.

Q. If you could do any other job in the world what would it be?

A. I would be a famous author like JK Rowling. I would have a large house on the beach with a rescue facility for animals and foster children. I would help find wonderful homes for them and write and publish stories about their struggles.



Q. What are the schools like in Peru?

A. Every single school in Peru, you have to wear the same uniform. It's a hot uniform, but Monica didn't go to school there.

Q. Where in Peru did you live? The Amazon?
A. Monica was born in Cajamarca and lived in
Chiclayo. These are small cities. They are not in the
Amazon.

Q. How are Peru and the United States similar?

A. They are similar because they have lots of beaches.

Q. How are they different?

A. They are different because Peru has lots of colors.
